WAITING ON GOD By Dr Marno Retief

I don't know about you, but for me one of the most frustrating aspects of the COVID-19 pandemic has been waiting. Waiting for restrictions to ease. Waiting for the next alert level to be announced. Waiting for international borders to open. It seems the pandemic has forced people all over the world to become better at waiting. As I write this reflection, sitting here in Bellville, South Africa, I am waiting to hear from the High Commission of Canada to South Africa in Pretoria about my work permit application. As is the case with most countries internationally, Canada's visa processing times have been adversely affected by the pandemic. Receiving the call as the new pastor of Emo CRC at the beginning of May 2020 has been one of the most exciting experiences in my journey of faith, yet simultaneously one of the most challenging experiences. I believe I have clearly sensed God calling me to move all the way from South Africa to Canada to take up the pastoral leadership of Emo CRC. Yet, here I am – almost five months since receiving the call to Emo CRC – still waiting for my Canadian work permit. I sometimes feel like the man who prayed, "Lord, please give me patience, but give it to me now!" My experience of waiting has reminded me of the fact that, as we seek to follow the Spirit of God's direction in our lives, part of that obedience to the Spirit is learning to wait on God.

Waiting is not just a lived reality in our lives, there are instances where the Word of God commands it. For example, the psalmist declares, "Wait patiently for the Lord. Be brave and courageous. Yes, wait patiently for the Lord" (Ps. 27:14, NLT). Elsewhere the psalmist says, "Be still in the presence of the Lord, and wait patiently for him to act" (Ps. 37:7, NLT). Scripture even speaks of those who wait on God as being blessed. The prophet Isaiah addresses the people of Judah with these words: "So the Lord must wait for you to come to him so he can show you his love and compassion. For the Lord is a faithful God. Blessed are those who wait for his help" (Isa. 30:18, NLT). In Luke 12, Jesus pronounces a blessing on those who await His Second Coming in a spiritually prepared state. Moreover, the Bible is full of characters who had to wait on God – think of people such as Abraham, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Job, and David, to name but a few – all of them had to wait quite some time before seeing the promises of God fulfilled in their lives.

In this season of my life, Abraham's journey of faith is especially inspiring to me, most probably because, like me, he experienced a clear call from the Lord to leave his country and travel to a new country. Genesis 12:1-4 (NLT) records:

The Lord had said to Abram, "Leave your native country, your relatives, and your father's family, and go to the land that I will show you. I will make you into a great nation. I will bless you and make you famous, and you will be a blessing to others. I will bless those who bless you and curse those who treat you with contempt. All the families on earth will be blessed through you." So Abram departed as the Lord had instructed, and Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five years old when he left Haran.

Notice how Abraham's name is still Abram when God calls him. But also notice how Abraham is seventy-five years old when God calls him. We only read about the Lord giving Abram his new name in Genesis 17, where the text mentions he is ninety-nine years old (Gen. 17:1). Some quick calculations help us discover how Abram waited twenty-four years before the Lord gave him his new name of Abraham. Why is this significant? In the ancient world, a person's name was highly significant – it often revealed something about their identity and destiny. Moreover, if you knew someone's name, this meant you were able to relate to them personally. Going a step further – giving someone a new name indicated that you had authority over that person. By changing Abram's name to Abraham, the Lord not only signalled His authority over him but gave him a new identity and deepened His relationship with Abraham.

Whereas the Hebrew meaning of Abram is 'exalted father,' Abraham means 'father of many.' Recall that the Lord's original promise to Abram in Genesis 12 was that He would make him "a great nation" (Gen. 12:2, NLT). Yet, in Genesis 17, the Lord expands this promise by telling Abraham he will be "the father of a multitude of nations" (Gen. 17:4). Interestingly, Genesis 17:1 marks the first time in Scripture where the Lord reveals himself to someone as 'El Shaddai' ('God Almighty'), emphasising how it is His power at work in Abraham's life. It is the power of God that enabled Abraham to persevere in his faith. As noted above, it took twenty-four years before the Lord granted Abram his new name – in essence, his new spiritual identity – as Abraham. Waiting on God is difficult but – just like in Abraham's life – God is busy shaping our spiritual character and identity throughout this process of waiting. When we find ourselves struggling to understand why God's promises in our lives seem to be taking so long, let us remember He is busy shaping us, molding us, according to His will and purpose. The Lord knows precisely what is required for the specific role to which He has called you and me. Moreover, He alone knows when we are ready to step into the destiny to which He has called us. May we embrace this truth while we are waiting on God.

Not what we think, but what the Bible says. As Dr. Marno says when we listen to his Bible reading, "think that Jesus is standing right beside us and says what scripture reads".

We are approaching Reformation Day and Halloween. With my Dutch background, we did not do anything for Halloween but the kids do like it here. Have a fun filled and safe evening.

As we look towards Reformation Day, we remember how important it is to be relieved from sin not by paying to Tetzel (and the church) but by knowing that our sins have been paid through Jesus' blood. What a courageous act that Martin Luther did. He was a German theologian and religious reformer who was the catalyst of the 16th-century Protestant Reformation.

Our condolences to Linda and her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, with the passing of John Esselink on August 31st. After John and Linda were married 66 years ago, their family grew to become a large family. There has been a lot said about John already—Candy Man, etc. He was a child of God. He showed that and we all can follow his example.

I was thinking about all the members we have lost through the years. They have showed us the direction to go, in following Jesus, obeying and trusting Him.



Dear Friends,

Warm greetings on this beautiful fall day. A glance outside my office window captures the changing of the seasons. Such an array of colour!

I'm reminded of God's words of promise right after the pandemic waters of Genesis 7:

"As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

God's faithfulness is our hope in these times of fear and uncertainty.

The COVID-19 pandemic certainly upended the activities of TLT around

the world. Almost all TLT training for church leaders takes place in small-group, in-person workshops. In the last six months of 2019, about two hundred workshops were held around the world. In the first six months of 2020, this number was less than one hundred. April through June saw almost no in-person trainings.

In some places, where internet technology was accessible, some groups hopped on to online platforms like *Zoom* or *Google Meet*. In addition to others, a group with Hindustan Bible Institute in India, another with Centro de



Entrenamiento a las Naciones in Colombia, and Resonate Global Mission in Japan held trainings this way.

Interestingly, holding trainings online allows participants from various countries and regions to be together, virtually. I was able to participate this way in a training in India with Harvest Mission in August.

But it is challenging. Many places around the world don't have reliable internet access. It is difficult to "read a room." Spontaneous discussions are infrequent, and usually awkward. Too many people have dogs.

However, a great deal of training in April-June 2020 did take place with the TLT manual "Loving Your Neighbor in

the COVID-19 Pandemic." You may recall from my last letter in May, that this was a manual we developed quickly in April to help groups around the world to respond to the pandemic: "In four lessons the manual highlights the value of all human life, the reality of pain and sickness, practical ways of preventing and responding to COVID-19, and a brief study of the parable of the Good Samaritan."

Most of the training with this manual took place in home-studies, but some also in socially-distanced groups, online, WhatsApp, YouTube, and by radio. Within weeks of sending out the manual, it had been translated

multiple times; by the end of August, it was in twenty-three languages. We were able to help thirteen ministry partners from around the world with modest grants of about \$500/each for printing and distribution.



One of our partners in Peru wrote, "Over 1,500 people were impacted after church leaders studied and shared the manual. Individuals were reached through distribution of food, organizing street sanitation, love offerings of funds, delivering medications, and more."

But we also heard from church leaders that additional challenges were cropping up during this time. Many people were very lonely and anxious. Abuse was being reported or suspected within homes where people were confined by stay-at-

home orders. One pastor from Egypt wrote, "I am ... seeing signs of fatigue and a need for forgiveness as people feel judged and misunderstood and hurt as a result of the social distancing that some are trying to practice, and others are not feeling the same need for. ..."

With this need in mind, we developed an additional lesson of four pages that we are *almost* ready to send to everyone who received the original manual. Here's a snippet of the lesson to give an idea of it's content and style.

4. God's Loving Peace: He Calms Our Troubled Hearts

- a. Read Psalm 142:1-2. What does the person in this psalm bring to God? What can you bring to God from your own life?
- b. Suffering involves loss. We lose control, dignity, positions, loved ones, jobs, dreams, and more. What have you lost during your time of difficulty or dark valley?
 - e. People respond to suffering in many different ways. Circle words you may feel. What other emotions do you feel? You may write them in the spaces below.

We are also preparing this lesson in an interactive video format that can be shared on WhatsApp and other social media platforms that are on peoples' smartphones. Chances are that more people will complete this lesson off their phone than from a manual.

So you can see that while COVID-19 has upended our training activities around the world, we haven't stopped. We've adjusted priorities, plans, and materials. We continue to serve the global church.

But it bears repeating: It is challenging. Thanks for your prayers and support as we meet these challenges by the grace of God.

Ministry Update: The Effects of COVID-19 on Our Work

It has been six months since we, in the Americas, started to seriously face the pandemic. So what has been the effect of this on our work in this region of the world?

First, very few people in our organization contracted the virus. However, this was unfortunately not the case for many of our closest partners in Peru where infection rates have been very high. Yet in general, we are dealing more with the effects of restrictions on travel than anything else. We are seeing domestic travel beginning to take place but very little international travel. I, Justin, do not expect to travel until well into 2021.

Most Bible translation projects are moving along just fine at this time. This is because they are mostly locally run and made up of teams of locals. But even when there were major lockdowns, most teams were able to work virtually.

What has been most affected is training and consulting. While most of this has managed to transition to virtual, a fair bit has been put on hold since some things need to be done while working face to face with one another.

Finance Update

As we continue in this ministry by giving leadership to the work of Bible translation and language development in the Americas, we trust God to supply our financial needs through churches and individuals like you. Part of our reliance on God is to make our needs known as we have them. We are currently lacking about \$300/month to reach 100% of the ministry budget that Wycliffe Canada has set for us. We are getting closer to our goal. Will you help us get there? Would you prayerfully consider becoming a financial partner with us? Or consider an increase in your monthly investment if you are already a financial partner?

How Can You Pray?

Pray for our brothers and sisters in Peru who continue to be battered by COVID-19. The situation is still quite bad. Many are still dying due to a lack of adequate healthcare. The indirect suffering of the

lockdown has led to significant hunger issues. Pray for our good friends at ATEK* and AIDIA** as they reach out and serve during this crisis.

Thanks for the part you play on our team, whether by praying, giving, or cheering us on. We are grateful for you.
