EMMANUEL: GOD WITH US

Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. And her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet:

"Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel" (which means, God with us). When Joseph woke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him: he took his wife, but knew her not until she had given birth to a son. And he called his name Jesus. (Matthew 1:18-25, ESV)

When people hear about a husband and wife who are going to have a baby, there are usually two questions people love to ask. The first question: Is it a girl or a boy? And the second question: What will the child's name be? Many times there's, of course, intense debate or even a quarrel about the child's name. Should it be a completely new name? Or does it have to be a family name? Or should it be a combination of the mother and father's name? Or should the child be named after a celebrity? The latter is, of course, the reason why some people are named Elvis, J-Lo, or Cher. But no matter how you look at it, most people realise the importance of names.

Your name is important, not only because it might sound beautiful, but also because names have meaning. Each one of us — our names have a specific meaning. No one understood the importance of this better than people in the ancient world, especially the Jews. In biblical times, people believed that someone's name said something about that person's unique character, something about the person's true identity. That's why we read in Proverbs 22:1 (ESV), "A good name is to be chosen rather than great riches, and favor is better than silver or gold". Your name was important because people got to know you through it. Thus, we read in the Bible, when parents chose a name for their child, they chose a name they believed would fit their child's character and calling. But more than that — naming someone also means that you have authority over that person. And if you agree that parents have authority over their children, how much more does God have authority over people?

When you study the Bible, you will notice that, when the Lord calls someone for a particular task, He often changes that person's name. For example, God changed Abram's name to Abraham, Jacob's name to Israel, Simon's name to Peter. In doing so, the Lord made it clear that He had absolute authority over that person's life. And in each case, the new name said something about God's specific calling for that person's life, and something about that person's character and identity. So, with this in mind, when we're dealing with the different names of Jesus in the Bible, we're dealing with different aspects of Jesus' character and identity. Getting to know the names of Jesus helps us to know Jesus personally. The purpose of my message today is to focus on just one of Jesus' names – namely, Emmanuel – so that we can understand how this name of Jesus can help us get to know Jesus better. Of all the names of Jesus revealed in the Bible, Emmanuel is probably one of the most important names. In fact, I would go so far as saying it's the name that teaches us most about who Jesus is. So, let's see why the name, "Emmanuel", is so important to us as followers of Jesus.

Consider what Matthew says in verses 22 and 23 of our opening passage: "All this took place to fulfil what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: 'Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel" (which means, God with us)". Now note – the passage that Matthew quotes, "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel" - this passage comes from Isaiah 7:14. So, Matthew connects this passage from the book of Isaiah with the person of Jesus. Matthew says, at Jesus' birth, He will be called Emmanuel. And then Matthew immediately explains what the name, "Emmanuel", means: "God with us".

Now that's extremely interesting – if I were to ask you, "Is there anywhere in the New Testament where Jesus refers to himself as Emmanuel?" What would you answer be? Well, simply said, the answer is no. Nowhere do we read about Jesus calling himself Emmanuel. In fact, neither do we read about any of Jesus' apostles or other followers calling him Emmanuel. Yet Matthew says here: Jesus will be called Emmanuel. So how should we understand this? Did Matthew make a mistake? Well, no - because remember what I said earlier, in the ancient world, people believed someone's name says something about their character, about who they are. When Matthew says Jesus will be called Emmanuel, he means Jesus' character, Jesus' identity, Jesus' being is that of Emmanuel – he is "God with us." Jesus is "God with us"! That's who he is! God with us! Just think about it! What a statement! What an incredible truth!

The name, "Emmanuel," reveals some essential aspects of Jesus' identity to us. So, what do we learn from this name of Jesus? What do we learn from the name, "Emmanuel"? One of the most important things it teaches us is the fact that Jesus is God. As we've seen, when Matthew quotes Isaiah 7:14 - which speaks of the virgin who will conceive and give birth to a son named Emmanuel - Matthew makes clear that Emmanuel means "God with us". Right from the beginning of his gospel, Matthew emphasises Jesus is God, but here's my question? On what basis did Matthew and the other New Testament writers have any reason to believe that Jesus is God? It's a huge statement to make. So, what was their evidence? Why were they so convinced of this? As the well-known astronomer and scientist, Carl Sagan, once said, "Extraordinary claims require extraordinary evidence". Ironically, as brilliant as Sagan was, he wasn't prepared to look at the evidence the Bible provided. Maybe some of you reading are struggling to believe that Jesus is God. You've got questions -you're uncertain. Well, then I want to invite you to take a serious look at the biblical evidence. Scripture alone is able to help us answer this question. Don't do what many people do and say you want to remain neutral, without ever looking at the evidence. So, let's look at the extraordinary evidence the Bible offers that Jesus is God.

Firstly, there are quite a few scriptures where the Bible directly declares Jesus is God. Let me just mention a few examples. In John 1:1 (ESV) we read, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God". In the context of John's gospel, we know Jesus is the Word. And John makes it clear - Jesus, the Word, is God. In Romans 9: 5 (ESV), Paul states Jesus is "God over all" and that he is "blessed forever"! And in 1 John 5:20, John refers to Jesus as "the true God". So, there are quite a few Scriptures which clearly state Jesus is God.

But then there are passages of Scripture which indirectly refer to Jesus as God. For example, we read how different Names of God are applied to Jesus. Isaiah 9: 6 (ESV) - which is a prophetic declaration about Jesus - calls Jesus "Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace". We also read how the Bible describes Jesus with characteristics that only God can have. In Colossians 1:17, Paul says Jesus already exists from eternity! At the end of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus tells his disciples that he is everywhere and always with them. Jesus says, "I am with you forever, even to the end of world history" (Matt. 28:20, ESV). In Revelation 2:23 (ESV), we see Jesus knows everything – He's the one "searches mind and heart". In Revelation 1:8, we learn that Jesus is almighty - He is "the Alpha and the Omega", the One "who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty"! And the writer of Hebrews tells us Jesus is unchangeable - "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13: 8, ESV). Jesus is worshiped as God - the apostle Thomas falls before Jesus and cries out, "My Lord and my God!" (John 20:28, ESV). And then there are other scriptures where Jesus is described as Creator, as the one who has the power to forgive sin, as the one who will raise believers from the dead, as the one who will judge all men. I ask you: Do you believe Jesus is God? Over and over – directly and indirectly – the Bible makes it clear: Jesus is God. So, when you and I call Jesus Emmanuel, we are, in effect, confessing this fundamental truth of the Christian faith: Jesus is God in the flesh.

As we celebrate Christmas this year, may our awareness of the divinity of Jesus intensify our worship of him, the God who became human to save us. As the Nicene Creed puts it, One Lord Jesus Christ, the only Son of God,

begotten from the Father before all ages,

God from God, Light from Light,

true God from true God,

begotten, not made; of the same essence as the Father.

Through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven;

he became incarnate by the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary . . .

Nevertheless, we saw Him at work through these hurdles - causing us to reflect on our faith, and to consider the humanity of our fellow travellers: noticing the stories represented and on display in these places of transit.

Fellow teachers gifted us with many practical provisions (blankets on our beds, food in our fridge), taught us how to get/use bus cards and taxis, and invited us over for dinner. Exploring various local attractions and authentic local foods (see next page) helped us adjust to jet lag and begin to get a feel for our new stomping grounds.

It has been wonderful to be at school with our students, to see their excitement to see their classmates for the first time since March, to look over their shoulders as they work out math problems, and more often than not, to laugh together.

Laughter is a big part of our life these days! We laugh as we mis-pronounce the Russian words we are working hard to learn, as we search the aisles for familiar foods, and accidentally buy hot sauce instead of pasta sauce! A week ago, we took a taxi to go get groceries, and in our shaky Russian, we asked the driver

"вы понимаете по-английски?" (do you understand English)

to which he replied "HET" (no) and with a laugh and a smile, he promptly reached for the radio to turn up the volume.






