YOU ARE BLESSED

In his book, *Awareness*, the late spiritual teacher and author, Anthony De Mello SJ, shares the following story:

A man found an eagle's egg and put it in a nest of a barnyard hen. The eaglet hatched with the brood of chicks and grew up with them.

All his life the eagle did what the barnyard chicks did, thinking he was a barnyard chicken. He scratched the earth for worms and insects. He clucked and cackled. And he would thrash his wings and fly a few feet into the air.

Years passed and the eagle grew very old. One day he saw a magnificent bird above him in the cloudless sky. It glided in graceful majesty among the powerful wind currents, with scarcely a beat of its strong golden wings.

The old eagle looked up in awe. "Who's that?" he asked.

"That's the eagle, the king of the birds," said his neighbor. "He belongs to the sky. We belong to the earth—we're chickens."

So the eagle lived and died a chicken, for that's what he thought he was.

I suspect many Christians go through their lives with this same kind of mentality. They live with a chicken mentality, when – in reality – they're eagles. They fail to recognise just how blessed they are. They fail to recognise the wonderful blessings God has given them through justification by faith. They fail to recognise this important truth: A justified person is a blessed person. Let me repeat that: A justified is a blessed person. But why? On what basis do I say a justified person is a blessed person? After all, it seems many Christians today don't view their justification in Christ and the spiritual blessings it brings as the basis for being blessed. Rather, many Christians seem to think material blessings such as money and various kinds of possessions are the only indication of being blessed. When these material things are missing, they look at themselves like the eagle who thought he was a chicken. They fail to recognise themselves as the blessed people of God they are. How do you view yourself? Do you think of yourself as blessed? And if so, why do you think you're blessed? As followers of Jesus, as people justified by trusting in Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, we need the right perspective on what it means to be blessed, we need to understand the spiritual blessings justification in Christ bring us. So, why does being justified by faith in Christ make you a blessed person?

Romans, chapter 5, highlights four spiritual blessings that justification by faith brings to our lives. Once you recognise the fact that these four spiritual blessings have been given to you, you will have a totally new understanding of what it means to be blessed. You'll understand how your blessedness is not connected to your level of material prosperity, but to the spiritual blessings you enjoy by faith in Jesus Christ. And as I said, in Romans 5, Paul highlights four spiritual blessings the justified person is privileged to enjoy, namely, peace, joy, hope, and love. Peace, joy, hope, and love – these blessings are yours in Christ and have a profound impact on how you approach your life in this world.

The first spiritual blessing you enjoy as a justified person is peace, peace with God. Millions of believers across the ages have testified to the newfound peace they experienced when they committed their lives to Jesus Christ. It's difficult to define this peace. The Greek word Paul uses here goes back to the Hebrew word, shalom, which refers to peace in the sense of wholeness, completeness, harmony, and well-being. Paul explains how, because of what Jesus Christ did on the cross, those of us who believe in him now have peace with God. In one of his other letters, Paul puts it this way: "For God in all his fullness was pleased to live in Christ, and through him God reconciled everything to himself. He made peace with everything in heaven and on earth by means of Christ's blood on the cross" (Col. 1:19-20). This peace is a done deal from God's side – it was accomplished by Jesus on the cross. But you can only share in this peace once you embrace what Jesus did on the cross. Otherwise, this peace will never be yours. This peace includes complete access to God. Yet, once again, you won't receive this access if you don't embrace what Jesus did on the cross.

Teruo Nakamura was a Taiwanese soldier who fought for the Japanese Imperial Army during the Second World War. However, after the war officially ended on 2 September 1945, Nakamura kept on fighting. Nakamura kept on fighting not just for a day, a week, a month, a year, or even a few years. No, Nakamura kept on fighting till he was arrested by the Indonesian military on 28 December 1974, almost 30 years after the end of the Second World War. Nakamura was the last of the so-called Japanese holdouts, soldiers of the Japanese Imperial Army who kept on fighting because they refused to believe that the war was really over, or didn't get the message, or simply refused to surrender. Now let's not laugh at Nakamura. Let's rather take a good look at ourselves. You see, many people today are like Nakamura – they keep on fighting God, although he's already offered them a perfect peace plan through Jesus Christ. But for some reason they refuse to accept God's peace plan in Christ. Are you one of them? Are you one of the people who refuses to embrace God's peace plan in Christ? Or are enjoying the peace that comes from putting your trust in Jesus Christ and his finished work on the cross?

But Paul speaks of a second spiritual blessing that belongs to the justified – the blessing of joy. Faith in Jesus Christ brings you a joy that no-one will ever be able to take from you. A joy that's resilient throughout the different seasons of life. As the New Testament scholar, F.F. Bruce, points out, in Romans 5, Paul refers to three objects of joy in a Christian's life. The first of these objects of joy is the prospect of enjoying eternal life with God, or "sharing God's glory," as Paul puts it. Whether your present circumstances are good or bad, whether you're living a comfortable life, or a life filled with suffering, it's only temporary – your eternal destination is eternal life in the presence of God. And I'm sure you'll agree with me, that's something to look forward to, something to get excited about.

The second object of joy Paul mentions is somewhat surprising – it's suffering. Now this might seem totally illogical to us, but Paul says we should rejoice when we experience "problems and trials." Yes, Paul says we should rejoice about suffering! Now surely Paul must be mistaken about this, don't you think? What on earth is good about suffering? Well, from a merely human perspective, nothing – there's nothing good about suffering. But Paul challenges us to look at suffering from a spiritual perspective, as an opportunity for God's grace to work in our lives. From this perspective, we begin to understand how suffering helps us to develop endurance in our faith. Endurance helps us to develop a more mature Christian character. And as we grow in our character, it serves to deepen our hope, to deepen our trust in the promises of God.

The third object of joy Paul mentions is God himself. Christians are to rejoice in God because, through faith in Jesus Christ, they enjoy a new relationship with God – instead of being God's enemies, they're now God's friends. But let's be honest – if you're not a Christian, you probably won't consider any of these things as a reason for joy. Or even as a Christian, it's possible you've lost perspective. We live in a world where many people equate joy with pleasure. But as followers of Jesus, we find joy in the prospect of eternal life, we find joy in suffering, and – most of all – we find joy in a relationship with God himself! Truly, Christians – more than anyone else – have reason to be joyful!

So, as people justified by faith, we enjoy the blessing of peace, and the blessing of joy, but we also enjoy the blessing of hope. Paul emphasises how the hope God gives the Christian “will not lead to disappointment.” Paul and his audience were well-acquainted with the Greek notion of hope. For the ancient Greeks, hope was nothing more than acknowledging the possibility of something that might occur in the future. But there was nothing certain about it. For Paul, the hope of the Christian is not some vague possibility, but absolutely certain. God's new world is sure and certain. This assurance is not only based on God's character as completely trustworthy and faithful. No, for Paul, it's also based on God's character as a God of love. On the basis of what God did for us by sending his only Son to die for our sins, we know just how deep his love for us is. Knowing how much God loves us and experiencing the reality of this love in our lives, there's no chance we'll end up disappointed. God will sustain us and lead us safely to his eternal presence.

Many world religions offer people some form of hope – a hope that there's something more than just this life. Islam offers people the promise of paradise where their every desire will be fulfilled. Buddhism offers people the prospect of continuous reincarnation till they reach a state of nirvana. Hinduism also teaches the concept of reincarnation, but people may look forward to breaking out of the reincarnation cycle by attaining a state of moksha. Judaism offers people the promise of olam ha-ba, the world to come. And a number of other religions offer people the hope of some kind of afterlife. Yet, from a biblical and Christian perspective, we need to be clear: All these religions, as well intentioned as they may be, are offering people false hope. Any vision of eternity that does not include being in the presence of the one and only true God is false. Any vision of eternity where Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are not glorified is no more than wishful thinking. Only faith in Jesus Christ offers you the blessing of a hope that's sure and certain. Only faith in Jesus Christ brings you eternal life in the presence of God. What's your hope for the future? Do you think this life is all there is? Or do you have the certain hope of eternal life in the presence of God? If you do, what a blessing to have such hope in your life.

But fourthly and finally, those people justified by faith in Christ enjoy the blessing of the assurance of God's love, knowing God loves them. We already touched on this truth a bit earlier in the message but knowing just how intensely God loves us is truly a great spiritual blessing. It's a truth that strengthens you and comforts you in the most difficult of times. Now from a biblical perspective, we know God loves everyone in a general sense. As Jesus teaches in Matthew 6, God even extends his loving care to the birds and the flowers, so we shouldn't doubt that he cares for human beings. But this general love God has for his creation is not the same as his saving love for those who believe in Christ. Those who believe in Christ enjoy God's love in a special way. But how do we know God loves believers so much? Paul explains God's love for believers by pointing to the death of Christ. Jesus died for us while we were still enemies of God, while we were still sinners, totally unable to save ourselves. While someone might conceivably be willing to die for a good person, Christ died for us while we were still sinners. This death of Jesus on the cross – a death he suffered for sinners – is powerful evidence of God's great love for us. I don't know about you, but I find the reality of God's love for me something really difficult to grasp. When I look at my life and I consider the mistakes I've made, the sins I've done, the various ways in which I have failed the Lord and continue to fail the Lord, then I don't feel like God could love me at all. No, when I look at these things, I cannot think of one reason for God to love me. But that's precisely the point. You see, God's decision to love you and me is precisely that – it's his decision. It's not based on our worthiness or the good works we've done. It's based on his decision. God has sovereignly chosen to extend his saving love to those who put their faith in Jesus Christ.

In his autobiography, *Timebends*, the critically acclaimed playwright, Arthur Miller, tells of his marriage to Hollywood icon and movie star, Marilyn Monroe. He relates how, during the filming of *The Misfits*, their marriage started unravelling and he became aware of Marilyn's extreme addiction to sleeping pills. He felt powerless to help her. She simply refused to listen to him. One evening, after Marilyn had yet again been given an injection to help her sleep, Miller looked at her while she lay sleeping and wished he had the faith to tell her, "God loves you, darling," and that Marilyn would have the faith to believe it. But Miller goes on to write how both Marilyn and he had lost their faith. They had no assurance of God's love for them. How sad and tragic when this assurance is missing from a person's life. But for those who believe in Jesus Christ – those who are justified by faith in him – God gives them the assurance of his love. As follower of Jesus, are you living with this assurance in your life? Do you know how much God loves you? I think we need to remind ourselves of this amazing truth again and again. As we face the ups and downs of life, it's easy to lose focus and forget about God's love for us. But in those times of doubt, let's look to the cross of Christ and remember God's great love for us.

Remember: You are blessed. You're not a chicken – you're an eagle! As someone who is justified by faith in Christ, you enjoy the spiritual blessings of peace with God, of joy, of hope, and the assurance of God's love.

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
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







No new Chinese scholars have arrived, but we are grateful to meet online with a handful of Chinese and one Taiwanese. We spent 3 meetings, or 6+ total hours, trying to explain the origins and real meaning of Christmas - which was brand new material for some, and a detailed review for a few who were with us last year. The story sounds like a fairy tale to unbelievers, and even if you believe in angels and miracles, believing we all really desperately need a Savior is hard to accept for most human beings. We pray, we share, and we pray some more for our listeners to truly hear and believe these glad tidings.



After 5+ years of faithful volunteering with our Friday group, one couple (on either side of the picture above) feels ready to try starting a second group that will meet every other Saturday night. This is bittersweet for us as it reduces our group's volunteers, drivers and places to meet, but is also good news in that it offers another opportunity for different and currently uninvolved students to connect at a different time. *Please continue to pray for God's provision of those needs for the Friday night LIFE group!*





We were very thankful for opportunities to host and co-host many students for Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Eve. I think these meals and overnight stays were fun and much appreciated by our guests, and quite fun and a blessing for us personally.
