From the Pastor's Heart

Dear Family

After much thought and reflection, I have decided to take a different approach to my monthly Care and Share devotion. Instead of offering you a theological reflection on some or other biblical or theological topic, I have decided to offer you a more pastoral reflection in the form of a letter. My primary reason for doing so is to engage with you more directly about matters affecting our lives together as a community of Jesus followers. Simply said – this monthly letter is an opportunity for me, as your pastor, to speak to you heart to heart.

As many of you are aware, the CRCNA's Synod 2022 took place from June 10-16 at Calvin University in Grand Rapids, Michigan, USA. One of the most important matters addressed by Synod this year was the Human Sexuality Report (HSR), a report commissioned by Synod 2016. Before Synod 2022, there was much discussion and debate among members of the CRCNA regarding whether Synod would declare that the CRCNA's teaching on premarital sex, extra-marital sex, adultery, polyamory, pornography, and homosexual sex holds confessional status. Synod 2022 declared that the CRCNA's teaching on these matters does hold confessional status, stating that "unchastity in the Heidelberg Catechism encompasses adultery, premarital sex, extra-marital sex, polyamory, pornography and homosexual sex, all of which violate the seventh commandment."

Following Synod's decision, members of the CRCNA want to know what this means in practical terms. People are asking questions like: What does this mean for Officebearers? What does this mean for members? What does this mean for LGBTQI+ members of the CRCNA and their families? I believe questions such as these are important and that the members of local churches in our denomination deserve clear answers. Accordingly, the Council of Emo CRC will be discussing its official response to Synod's decision at its July meeting and will quite possibly issue a position statement during the first half of July.

In my years of pastoral ministry up to now, I have always felt very passionately about the principle the apostle Paul relates in his letter to the Ephesians, namely, "speaking the truth in love" (Eph. 4:15, ESV). I cannot emphasise the importance of this principle enough. We

need to engage with each other with truth and love – truth and grace. If we communicate the truths of our faith in an aggressive or intolerant way, we will end up alienating people, rather than helping them experience the life-changing grace of Christ. As the editor in chief of The Banner, Shiao Chong, urges in his editorial of June 27, 2022, "May we not become a church of loveless orthodoxy, lest Christ removes our lampstand." Thus, while we should unashamedly and unapologetically proclaim all biblical and Reformed truth, may we always do so with love. Let's remember Paul's words to the church in Corinth, "And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing" (1 Cor. 13:2, ESV).

Please know I am here to journey with on your journey of faith, as you and I together seek to follow Jesus on the way of the cross.

Hello to my Emo CRC church family!

It's been great to be back in Canada after a month of new experiences and travel all the way to Africa and back.

I was recently blessed to travel to Liberia as an intern for the non-profit One Body One Hope. Our group spent 14 days in country, working primarily with the Abide in the Vine Discipleship Church network, which is the Liberian organization with which OBOH partners.

Liberia is a country with a unique history, founded by former American slaves who were relocated from the United States, and is the oldest independent republic on the continent of Africa. Conflicts between the indigneous tribes of Liberia and the Americo-Liberian population resulted in two civil wars in the country, spanning from the 1980's until a peace deal was signed in 2003. These civil wars devastated the country and still impact development work to this day.

AVDC was founded by Pastor Emmanuel F Bimba and his wife Fattue S Bimba as a church and orphanage to care for children who had lost their parents in the war. This network has now expanded to over 25 church plants, with several orphanages and Christian schools throughout the country that are all sponsored by OBOH. Our work on this trip was to visit as many of these churches/schools and orphanages as possible and gather the stories of each place to bring back to donors in the United States. We interviewed pastors and principals all across Liberia, and hearing their life experiences was a testament to the intricate ways our God works. I found especially convicting how committed each Pastor was to the mission of their churches; to make disciples and to fulfill the purpose of Christ.

Another part of my work in Liberia was to visit and consult on some projects ongoing at the farm OBOH helped to start a few years ago. This was an especially exciting experience for me, because I got to see first-hand some of the profits that are coming from this farm after years of work. Rice, plantains, cocoa, palm and cucumbers are all crops being grown on the farm, and this coming year will be the first where palm and cocoa harvests can begin to be sold and generate revenue for the AVDC churches. A new bridge, processing facility and dam system are all projects underway that will continue to develop the farm. Out of the devastation of the civil wars, much of Liberian agricultural tradition was lost and the farm is now a place where they are able to regain and restore some of their practices which is a beautiful thing to see.

My experience in Liberia was a gift I will continue to treasure as I go forward. It is a special opportunity to be welcomed into an unfamiliar culture when there is a familiar God to link us all together. Please pray for the new friends I've made in Liberia and for the country as a whole. Over 80% of the population lives under the international poverty line, and lack of economic opportunity makes it very difficult for even educated Liberians to find jobs. Pastors in the AVDC network do not receive salaries and teachers make so little that their monthly rent is commonly higher than what they are paid. It is very difficult to improve your life when the funds to do so don't exist outside of international aid. Despite all this, the Liberian culture is very giving and welcoming of guests, and we were all so beautifully cared for in every place that we visited.

At the end of each interview we conducted, my team would ask the Principal or Pastor for a specific prayer request. Two of the requests that have stayed with me came from Pastors Enoch and Rebecca. Enoch asked for prayer that people in his congregation would make themselves available to the work that God has called them to, and Rebecca asked that God would help us to complete his projects. I was struck by the selflessness and kingdom-oriented nature of these requests coming from pastors in mud brick churches with no electricity or windows.

Both of these prayers I also pray over our own congregation. That we would make ourselves available to the work and projects that God is calling Emo CRC towards, and pursue them with all the enthusiasm of truly kingdom-oriented servants. There is so much blessing in pursuing the will of God, and this was displayed to me more than ever in the lives of Liberians whose trust in the Lord extended even to where they would find food for their next meal.

In Liberian culture, it is customary for a church congregation to conduct welcoming services for guests. The entire congregation stands around the guests and repeats three times in English and three in their native language, the phrase: "You are welcome." So, on behalf of my new Liberian friends:

You are welcome, you are welcome, you are very welcome here.

Thank you for being my church family, and for always making me feel welcome and supported throughout the places I have ventured so far. I know that you will continue to do so. I pray that we can extend the same kind of welcome even more into our community and remind others of God's love for Emo, Ontario. Know that you are all covered in prayers by the church in Liberia, they love you and pray that God will work in us as a congregation. Together we help to make up the family of God and I appreciate that reality more now than ever.

Passing it on...

Last month we shared the exciting news that the Eastern Apurimac Quechua Bible is now complete and ready to print. Let us introduce you to a friend of ours from this translation team. Pastor Oscar (middle of the picture) is from a small, little-known city in a far-off part of the Peruvian Andes. His first language is Eastern Apurimac Quechua. At the very end of 2021, he and a team of four other pastors from his province finished translating the entire Bible into their language. It was a monumental task that took them 17 years. David Coombs is also a close friend of ours and he has walked alongside this team from the start by training, mentoring and ultimately doing the translation quality checks.



Oscar and the others are so passionate about the transforming power of God's Word that in February they started training new translators in another language (La Union Quechua). Oscar is thrilled to be able to pass on what he has learned and walk alongside this new team. At the same time, he is receiving additional training and mentoring (from David Coombs) in order to become a certified Bible translation consultant who can check and verify the accuracy and quality of translations for publication. All of the world's major Bible translation and publishing organizations have agreed on rigorous quality standards to ensure that God's Word is translated as accurate, clear and natural.

Please pray for Pastor Oscar and thousands of others like him around the world that selflessly give of themselves so that others can have God's Word in a language that they truly understand.


